## 2021 BUDGET APPROVED

Given the uncertainty of how the economy would weather the pandemic, the City of Fairway implemented significant measures in April to reduce budgeted expenditures for the remainder of 2020. Like many of you, the City of Fairway has many questions about how the COVID-19 pandemic will affect the economic outlook into 2021. Typically, the City builds its next year's budget from scratch using a "modified zero-based budget process". This means each Department identifies the services and functions it performs, justifies them at the Department level, Committee level and Finance Committee level and builds a line item budget starting at zero. For the 2021 budget, which was due to the County Clerks office last month, the City took a different approach. Given that sales taxes have remained steady (we initially forecast a reduction of up to 25%), Departments



were given guidance in May to do two things regarding the 2021 budget: 1) Budget flat from 2020, and 2) within that flat budget, identify 10% for potential reductions in 2021. This meant that no additional requests for funds would be considered initially and that Departments should prepare for the possibility of only having 90% of the funds budgeted in the current year for 2021. Fortunately, the City's revenues are fairly diversified between property taxes, sales taxes and fees for service. In addition, the City has not seen a drastic reduction in sales tax collection. The final 2021 budget for the general fund increased by only 0.67% from the current year. The City will continue to closely monitor the budget and make necessary adaptations based on current conditions. ## PUBLIC MEETING POLICY

As with most businesses, many cities had to quickly modify how they conducted business during the initial months of the pandemic. The City of Fairway held its March 2020 City Council meeting as it had for many years, in person, at City Hall. By the end of that same week, teachers were sending iPads and MacBook's home with students in anticipation that they may not immediately return after spring break. If we can all agree on one thing, it is that things changed rapidly. In April, public meetings met via the virtual platform, Zoom, the likes of which most hadn't heard of just a month earlier. Seven months in and we are still conducting all meetings via Zoom and no one knows when in-person meetings will resume. One of the many lessons learned was that over the years, the City of Fairway had strayed from its Public Meeting Policy, first adopted in 2006. As administrations have changed since the initial approval by the Governing Body, the practice of conducting City Council meetings has become more open, allowing more engagement between residents and their elected neighbors. The current administration initiated the broadest public comment policy, allowing public comment during each agenda item under new business. Following the May City Council meeting, it was discovered just how much different our "practice" was from our "policy". As a result, the Administration Committee directed staff to update the policy to make it more reflective of our practice. A new Public Meeting Policy pertaining to City Council meetings and Council Committee meetings was adopted in July of this year and can be found on the City's website. At present, Fairway is the only City in the area that allows public comment via virtual meetings when there is no statutory requirement to do so, such as when they are conducting a public hearing. Public Comment may also be submitted via e-mail ahead of time (prior to 5:00 p.m. on the day of the meeting) to City Staff who will distribute it to the Governing Body. ## From the Mayor's Desk



These times are challenging. Whether we live or work in the City of Fairway, the past six months have been difficult for all of us. Life brings these times in many forms but the COVID-19 virus has affected each and every one of us at the same time. However, a handful of positive things have occurred. Have you noticed that friendships have strengthened, past friendships have been rekindled and new friendships have developed. Maybe you now know your neighbors as garage doors have been opened, families have been out walking and outdoor exercise has become popular. I'm sure you could add to the list and all of us should remember this is a struggle we share, so take time to be positive as the next person you see may need your help.

The City would like to say a big THANK YOU to Scout Christopher Alka, his Boy Scout Troop 299 from Prairie Village Asbury United Methodist Church, Scoutmaster Curtis DeWitt and Troop 282 from Leawood United Methodist Church, Scoutmaster Joel Whitaker. As part of his Eagle project, Christopher invited his family, friends, fellow members and parents from both Troops to clean up the cemetery located south of SMP between Canterbury and Chadwick. They also re-built the bench and re-set several of the tombstones. They were "happy to join groups and make a difference in our community."

This is the time of year for completing the City's financial audit and submitting to the County and State our 2021 budget. The 2019 audit has given the City a clean opinion, meaning we are operating as we should be, all State statutes are met, internal controls are in place and functioning and our financial position is strong. These results help us maintain our AA+ bond rating.

The 2021 budget as presented to and approved by the City Council in August leaves the mill levy flat at 19.928 for the fifth consecutive year. The City's mill levy is ranked in the lower 1/3 of the surrounding cities in northeast Johnson County. For the average appraised value of a home in Fairway (\$481,876), the annual City tax is \$1,104 (\$92/month) or approximately 1/6 of the total property tax bill. Next year's budget was difficult to project due to the continuing effect of the COVID-19 virus. Although we have experienced loss of revenues this year, the decrease has not been as deep as originally projected. However, concerns for the remainder of the current year continue. Consequently, the General Fund budget for 2021 shows only a very slight increase over the budget for the current year. City staff has managed expenses extremely well to continue services to the City cutting all discretionary spending where possible.

Weekly collection for \$21.00 per month


Every other week collection for \$14.00 per month

# What's Wrong with My Trees?

In some cases, trees are thin with few leaves, or certain branches die, or the tree was slow to leaf out or entire trees die suddenly. The most common cause this year is environmental stress. Stress is cumulative. Trees can be affected by stresses that happened up to several years in the past. Recent stresses in Kansas include winter damage this last fall as well as the extremely dry winter of 2017-2018.

Trees affected will not die immediately. A healthy root system has stored energy reserves that will keep the tree alive but once those reserves are depleted, the entire tree or a portion of the tree will die very quickly. Usually this occurs during the summer following the year the damage occurred. That is what we are seeing now. So, is there anything we can do now to help the trees? Trees that were slow to leaf out or are thin should be given the care needed to prevent further stress. Primarily, that means to water the tree as needed. Keep the soil moist but not waterlogged.

Take a few minutes to step outside and take a good look at all of the trees on your property. It is important to monitor the trees in order to protect you home, neighboring homes and utility lines. If you see something that causes you concern, you should have the tree inspected immediately and address any hazards.

## Can I Have My Street Trees Pruned by My Own Tree Service?

The previous issue of the newsletter featured an article about the City-wide tree maintenance program, including an arborist examining trees along the streets and routine maintenance is performed. This program occurs annually for 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of the City. This maintenance includes examining the health of the trees, pruning of large dead branches, crossed limbs, broken or hanging limbs and trimming sprouts on the lower 8 feet of the tree. Maintaining clearance over streets of 15 feet and yards/sidewalks of 8 feet is also included. For more details check out the March newsletter <http://bit.ly/MarchFocusOnFairway>

Although the City performs this maintenance, we still occasionally get calls from residents asking if they can have their street trees pruned by their own tree service at their own expense. The short answer is yes, but only with permission from the Community Tree Manager. Fairway's Public Tree Protection Ordinance includes several directives that help protect Fairway's trees. Pruning practices are required to conform to ANSI A300 standards, which reputable tree care services should already be familiar with.



Some of the main reasons to prune trees include safety, health, and aesthetics. If the reason you would like to prune involves a safety issue or concerns the health of the tree contact Fairway's Public Works Department 913-722-2822 to have the tree evaluated. If you would like

to have it pruned for aesthetics or to raise the canopy contact the Public Works Department for permission first. Someone from the department will discuss your pruning plans with you to make sure they are in accordance with the tree protection ordinance and the Community Tree Manager will make the decision. Common pruning mistakes involve removing too much of the canopy at once either by excessive crown thinning or raising the canopy too high.

If approval is given for pruning, please keep in mind that the work must be done by professionals. From the ANSI A300 standards:

**2.3.1** Tree maintenance shall be performed only by arborists or arborist trainees who, through related training or on-the-job experience, or both, are familiar with the practices and hazards of arboriculture and the equipment used in such operations.

### References: Fairway Municipal Code

Sec. 11-56 (c) Property owners, at their expense and with permission from the Community Tree Manager, shall have the right to perform normal tree maintenance on all street trees on their property provided it is not potentially detrimental to the health of the tree.

Sec. 11-58. - Tree topping.

No person or City department shall top any community tree, or tree on public property. Trees severely damaged by storm or other causes, or trees under utility wires or other obstructions where other pruning practices are impractical may be exempt from this section at the determination of the Tree Board or the Community Tree Manager. **Pruning practices shall conform to current ANSI A300 standards.**

## 2020 CURBSIDE LEAF REMOVAL PROGRAM


The City of Fairway has arranged for Benjamin Lawn & Landscape to offer a group rate for residential curbside leaf removal for the fall of 2020. Recognizing that some residents may not be able to utilize the service for a variety of reasons, this is a **voluntary program**. For curbside leaf removal on these specified dates, the cost is \$41 for pick-up #1 only, \$54 for pick-up #2 only OR, \$77 for both.

**Step 1:** See the Collection Calendar for when Benjamin Lawn & Landscape will be in your Ward doing curbside leaf removal on dates noted

**Step 2: Review the guidelines.** For a successful curbside leaf pick-up, please remember the following:

- Benjamin Lawn & Landscape trucks are equipped with a side mount vacuum designed to vacuum a long row of leaves. Rake leaves into a pile along the curb (edge of the lawn) that is as long and narrow as possible. The machines can reach 6 feet into the yard so leaves beyond 6 feet may not be removed.
- Leaves are to be raked up to the edge of the lawn as noted above. **DO NOT** rake leaves into the street or gutter and **DO NOT** block the sidewalk.
- Leaves only. Remove sticks, rocks, trash, and other debris.
- Do not block the leaf row with vehicles on collection day.



**Step 3: SIGN-UP & PAY ONLINE** at [www.BenjaminLawn.com](http://www.BenjaminLawn.com) click on "Curbside Leaf Removal". If you prefer to pay by check, mail **completed form and payment to the address listed below.**

**Step 4: Then, don't forget to rake your leaves to the edge of your lawn prior to your collection day(s)!**

### Property Codes Reminder

With the recent heavy rainstorms Codes Administration Staff would like to remind all residents of a few items that may help ease some of the water issues experienced in Fairway:

- Gutters, downspouts, and drainage areas should be kept clean and free of debris. Do not deposit yard waste or brush into the creek or other drainage areas.
- Water discharges from sump pumps, foundation drains, or other similar sources, excluding lawn sprinkler, shall not be discharged at a point closer than five feet (5') to any adjoining property line nor in a manner that creates a public nuisance.
- If you are installing new drain lines please note drain lines are not allowed to daylight within the City Right-of-Way (10-12 feet from the curb).

The WCA trash collection contract includes collection of up to two bulk items per month. Scheduled collection for one "no charge bulk item" is on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> service day each month. Bulk items include: couch, chair, dresser, mattress, etc. Bulk items collection excludes appliances and electronics.

#### **Construction materials will not be collected.**

Additional removal of bulk items exceeding 2 items per month may be arranged by contacting WCA to make arrangements. Appliances or items not qualified as "bulky items" can be collected for an additional fee. Non-freon containing white goods are charged a \$25.00 service fee billed to the resident.
